Black babies have a 2.8x higher mortality rate than Asian American babies according to America's Health Ranking Report, 2021. As black Americans age, their health inequalities do not go away. The most recent example was during the COVID pandemic years 2020 and 2021 when 37% of hospitalizations were older African Americans, but they only make up 9% of the 65 and older population (National Caucus and Center on Black Aging). Marcy Hankins in Elm 164 was born in Indianapolis, but it took a while for her to get back to her birthplace. Her family moved to



Flat Rock, IN, then to Geneva, IN, and finally to Hope, IN, where Marcy graduated from Hauser High School. She volunteered as a Candy Striper at the Columbus, IN, hospital from her 8th through 12th grades. After graduation she was trained and served as a Certified Nursing Assistant at that same hospital.

Marcy volunteered again, this time for the U.S. Army in 1970. She spent her first 8 weeks at Fort McClellan, Alabama, followed by 8 weeks at Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio, TX, where she received medical training. In Fort Bragg, NC, she spent two years in pediatrics as a nursing assistant.

Her first overseas tour was

and delivery, as well as in the neonatal
intensive care unit. Then back to Fort
Bragg with a MASH unit before she was
shipped out again to Germany, where

followed by a return to Fort Sam
Houston for more medical training as a
medical assistant.

Marcy retired from the military at Fort

Polk, Louisiana, as a Field Unit Combat Medic in 1990. In addition to her extensive hands-on medical service, she also was adept in managing medical records.

The Veterans Administration had a hiring freeze when Marcy retired. Always adventurous, she worked a series of odd jobs until she could spend her final 12 years at our VA hospital.

Some highlights of her military career include eating the fantastic food in Germany, taking hiking trips there, and visiting Italy, Vienna, and Greece when on leave. Some low-lights of Okinawa were tasting octopus and squid - much too salty for Marcy's palate.

As you communicate with this amazing woman, you will notice a unique dialect. Marcy explained after suffering a stroke that affected her speech, the words that now come out take on a Scandinavian flair. Sure enough, that reflects her actual heritage!
